A neighborhood meeting of the Kalamazoo City Commission was held on Monday, October 19, 2015 at 6:00 p.m. in the Community Room at City Hall, 241 W. South Street.

An opportunity was given for miscellaneous communications, but no communications were offered.

Downtown Citizen Advisory Council

The Downtown Citizen Advisory Council representative:

- described the membership and purpose of the Downtown Development Area Citizens' Council (DDACC).
- reviewed the results of a recent survey of DDACC members. A copy of the survey results was filed with the papers for this meeting.
- highlighted projects the DDACC was involved with – community garden; late night event noise; downtown bike trails; Bates Alley Project; Dog Parks/Greenspace; KRVt Downtown Connector; Michigan Avenue 2-way conversion, Arcadia Commons West.
- asked Commissioners the following questions: What development will be a catalyst for change in next 5 years?; and What else can the DDACC do to work with the City?; What more do you want to know about the DDACC?

Commissioner Urban stated the Arcadia Commons West project would be an important development.

Vice Mayor Anderson stated change in the downtown had happened because of residential development, and this would continue to be the driver of growth in the future. Vice Mayor Anderson requested the survey results be sent to Commissioners.

Commissioner Cinabro remarked that the downtown was all retail when he was growing and stated a metamorphosis had taken place over the past 20 years.

Mayor Hopewell noted the City and the City Commission were very connected with technology, and he urged the members of the DDACC and downtown stakeholders to connect with City through technology.

The Northside Association for Community Development representatives:

- described a "Show Me the Money" event planned for January 9th to address personal finance issues.
- reported NACD was providing affordable housing for seven people and described how this had been helpful to those residents.
- stated the Association was working with City staff on a walkability study.
- indicated the Association had worked with the Building Blocks program over the summer and reported 15 residents and 3 rental units had been helped through this program.
- reported the X-train problem had not gone away but had improved some.
- indicated gentrification had begun to take place and stated NACD was working to try to help residents stay in their homes.
- Ms. Dandridge asked the City to do something about the large potholes and poor condition of the sidewalks in front of her home at 1402 N. Rose Street.

In response to a question from Commissioner Urban, Ms. Dandridge and Ms. Jordan-Woods stated cars cut through the Rose/Clay Street area to avoid traffic lights on other streets, and they noted there had been an increase in criminal activity in that area recently.

Commissioner Cunningham noted residents frequently identified potholes as a significant issue for the Neighborhood.

Commissioner Urban urged citizens to talk with staff first before bringing their issues to the City Commission. Commissioner Urban expressed hope that the City would develop mechanism to recognize residents who were doing good work in the City.

The West Main Hill Neighborhood Association representative:

- thanked the Parks and Recreation Department for removing dead trees in Jones Park.

- stated the Association was working with the Parks and Recreation Department to develop a community garden in Henderson Park.
- expressed concern about cut-through traffic between Stadium Drive and West Main Street.
- reported a traffic study had been performed approximately two weeks prior and expressed hope that the study would lead to additional traffic control/traffic calming measures.
- discussed the work being done on the stadium lighting ordinance and expressed confidence that a good compromise could be reached.
- stated there had been problems with a group of teens vandalizing homes near the neighborhood tot lot.

In response to a question from Commissioner Urban, Ms. Wright stated the Neighborhood boundaries were from Kalamazoo College on the east to a few blocks past Dartmouth on the west, and between West Main Street and West Michigan Avenue on the north and south.

In response to a question from Commissioner Cooney, Ms. Wright explained motorists were using a route that followed Lovell Avenue, Monroe Street, Academy Street, and Berkley Street to cut through the Neighborhood.

Next, an opportunity was given for citizen comments.

Lauren Rosenthal, non-resident and Program Assistant with the Young Adult Diversion Court (YADC), introduced Alora and Jacinda, who described their experiences in the YADC and presented ideas to the Commission for helping young people in the community. Ms. Rosenthal distributed a document describing the YADC, a copy of which was filed with the papers for this meeting.

Jody Dozeman, non-resident, spoke about problems she was having. A written communication from Ms. Dozeman was filed with the papers for this meeting.

By unanimous consent the City Commission adopted its meeting agenda with the following change:

A citizen requested that Item F-1, a contract extension for grass mowing, be moved to the Regular Agenda.

City Manager Ritsema announced the City's United Way campaign would run from October 19th through October 30th. City Manager Ritsema noted Kalamazoo was competing with the City of Battle Creek to see which organization could get the highest participation rate.

Communications

Consent Agenda items were presented as follows with a recommendation to approve the items and authorize for the City Manager to sign on behalf of the City:

Consent Agenda

- approval of a one-year extension of a term contract for the purchase of natural gas for various City departments in an amount not to exceed \$500,000.
- adoption of a **RESOLUTION** approving three new Neighborhood Enterprise Zone Certificate Applications for 1006 S. Park Street, 818 S. Park Street, and 407 Locust Street.
- approval and acceptance of an easement from Kalamazoo Valley Community College for sanitary sewer installed as part of the Healthy Living Campus.
- approval of the minutes from the City Commission meetings on September 14, September 21, and October 5, 2015.
- approval of a request to hold until November 16, 2015 consideration of the sale of 1217 John Street to Alfredo and Linda Zuniga for \$120.00.

Commissioner Cinabro, seconded by Commissioner Urban, moved to approve the consent agenda requests and authorize the City Manager to sign all documents on behalf of the City.

With a roll call vote this motion passed unanimously.

When an opportunity was given for citizens to comment on a contract extension with Stap Brothers Lawn and Landscape Service for mowing grass at City parks, green spaces and municipal buildings in the amount of \$120,987, the following people addressed the City Commission:

Kris Mbah, City resident, questioned why the City was not using a local business to provide grass mowing services. Mr. Mbah asked for an explanation of the evaluation metrics used to award contracts, and he asked what the City did to reach out to local vendors.

Commissioner Miller, seconded by Commissioner Cunningham, moved to approve a contract extension with Stap Brothers Lawn and Landscape Service for mowing grass at City parks, green spaces and municipal buildings in the amount of \$120,987.

Prior to a vote on the motion, and in response to a question from Vice Mayor Anderson, City Attorney Robinson described the City's Local Preference Purchasing Policy and noted the policy did not automatically award a contract to a qualifying local bidder but allowed the local bidder to match the lowest, responsive, responsible bid.

In response to a question from Commissioner Urban, City Attorney Robinson stated the awarding of a contract extension meant the original contract allowed for extension periods, which essentially renewed the contract for another term.

Commissioner Urban expressed an interest in having staff prepare a report on the City's recruitment of local businesses.

City Attorney Robinson explained what the phrase "responsible, responsive bidder" meant and indicated there were requirements for bonds and insurance coverage that small companies might not be able to meet.

By consensus the Commission requested that the City Manager prepare and present a report to the Commission on the City's recruitment of local businesses.

With a roll call vote this motion passed unanimously.

When an opportunity was given for citizens to comment on a Comprehensive Transfer Agreement between the City of Kalamazoo, Central County Transportation Authority (CCTA), Kalamazoo Transit Authority Board (TAB), and Kalamazoo County Transportation Authority (KCTA), the following people addressed the City Commission:

Linda Teeter, City resident and Chair of the KCTA and CCTA, remarked on the importance and historic nature of this vote. Ms. Teeter reported the KCTA, CCTA, and TAB had all voted unanimously to approve the agreement at 11:45 a.m. that morning.

Garrylee McCormick, City resident, urged the City Commission to approve the Transfer Agreement.

Vice Mayor Anderson, seconded by Commissioner Cinabro, moved to approve a Comprehensive Transfer Agreement between the City of Kalamazoo, Central County Transportation Authority, Kalamazoo Transit Authority Board, and Kalamazoo County Transportation Authority.

Prior to a vote on the motion, Vice Mayor Anderson noted this was a historic moment. Vice Mayor Anderson stated there was a lot of work to be done over the next year, but there was momentum building to get it done.

Commissioner Cinabro commended Ms. Teeter for hard work and stated this was a moment to celebrate.

With a roll call vote this motion passed unanimously.

Community Planning and Development Director Laura Lam delivered a PowerPoint presentation entitled *Imagine Kalamazoo 2025*. A copy of the presentation was filed with the papers for this meeting.

In response to a question from Commissioner Urban, Director Lam stated citizens could participate in the process by contacting the Community Planning and Development Department or by engaging with the soon-to-be-launched website.

City Manager Ritsema thanked Director Lam and her staff for their efforts on community engagement.

When given an opportunity to comment on a RESOLUTION supporting the Local Housing Assistance Fund Millage Request that would be submitted to voters on November 3, 2015, the following people addressed the City Commission:

Frank Warren, City resident, expressed concern about the effect of the tax on senior citizens and stated the new funds would have a negligible effect.

Commissioner Urban, seconded by Commissioner Cooney, moved to adopt a **RESOLUTION** supporting the Local Housing Assistance Fund Millage Request that would be submitted to voters on November 3, 2015.

Prior to a vote on the motion, Commissioner Cooney noted there were over 1,000 children in the Kalamazoo Public School District who were homeless. Commissioner Cooney thanked Vice Mayor Anderson for his work on this issue.

Commissioner Urban noted the tax would be a countywide millage that would serve children and families in all school districts.

Commissioner Miller thanked Vice Mayor Anderson for his work on this issue and expressed support for the resolution. Commissioner Miller also expressed concern about another tax being levied on City residents.

Mark Muhich, non-resident, spoke about the dangers of the Palisades Nuclear Power Plant and asked the City Commission to adopt a resolution urging the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's Atomic Safety Board to physically test the reactor pressure vessel. Information submitted by Mr. Muhich was filed with the papers for this meeting.

Tracy Hall, City resident, thanked Commissioners Cinabro and Miller for their service on the City Commission.

Jeff Weisman, City resident, expressed concern about the lack of adequate lighting downtown, especially on Rose Street between Kalamazoo Avenue and South Street. Mr. Weisman asked the Commission to form a Committee to address sidewalk lighting.

Iris Potter, City resident, read a letter from Michigan Safe Energy Future regarding Palisades Nuclear Power Plant. A copy of the letter was filed with the papers for this meeting.

Frank Warren, City resident, spoke about the need for taxi cabs in the City to have meters, the new veterans' memorial in Riverview Cemetery, and Veterans Day ceremonies at Fort Custer National Cemetery.

Dave Carrell, non-resident, expressed concern about the potential relocation of the Viet Nam Veterans Memorial in Bronson Park.

James Saur, non-resident, expressed opposition to the relocation of the Viet Nam Veterans Memorial in Bronson Park.

Tim Graham, City resident, thanked Commissioners Cinabro and Miller for their service on the City Commission. Mr. Graham spoke about the lack of whole systems thinking to solve problems and stated Director Lam was on the right path with a holistic approach to the City's strategic vision.

Bruce Brown, non-resident, expressed concerns about the safety of Palisades Nuclear Power Plant. Information provided by Mr. Brown was filed with the papers for this meeting.

Matt Lechel, City resident, thanked Commissioners Cinabro and Miller for their service on the City Commission. Kris Mbah, City resident, thanked Commissioners Miller and Cinabro for their service. Mr. Mbah asked the Commission to take a stand regarding the Palisades Nuclear Power Plant. Mr. Mbah spoke about the citizen comment sheet idea he had submitted and stated the Commission did not realize that its own Purchasing Policy was being broken. Jared Volz, non-resident, thanked the City Commission for its work and Commissioners Cinabro and Miller for their service on the Commission. Jon Hoadley, City resident, commended Commissioners Cinabro and Miller for their service on the City Commission Zachary Lassiter, City resident, thanked the City Commission for its work. Mary Balkema, City resident, thanked Commissioners Cinabro and Miller for their service on the City Commission and presented them with flowers.	Citizen Comments (cont'd)
Finally, an opportunity was given for miscellaneous comments and concerns of City Commissioners. At the request of Mayor Hopewell, Public Safety Chief Jeff Hadley reported he was on the committee for placing a Lincoln memorial in Bronson Park, and the idea of relocating the Viet Nam Memorial to make room for a Lincoln memorial had not been discussed. Commissioner Cunningham announced an upcoming event for the Kalamazoo Youth Development Network and offered remarks on the service of Commissioners Cinabro and Miller. Commissioner Urban expressed appreciation for Commissioners Cinabro and Miller. Commissioner Cooney thanked Commissioners Miller and Cinabro for their service. Vice Mayor Anderson offered appreciative remarks to Commissioners Cinabro and Miller for their service to the City of Kalamazoo. Mayor Hopewell stated he would save his remarks about Commissioners Miller and Cinabro for the next meeting. Commissioner Cinabro commented on his years of service to the City and thanked his fellow Commissioners, the Commission appointees, and his family and friends for their support over the years. 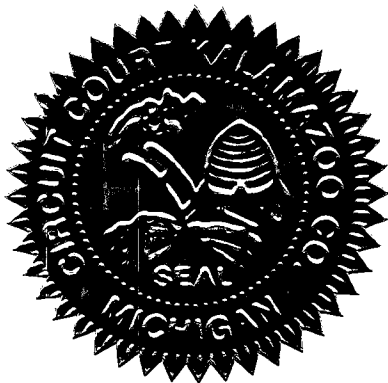
